CHARACTERISTICS OF DEGREE PROGRAMME

General and specific learning objectives

The Master's Degree Programme in Migration Studies and New Societies, entirely taught in English and structured as a Joint Degree, is delivered in cooperation with the Universities of Warsaw and Prague (Charles University). It forms part of the educational activities offered within the framework of the 4EU+ European University Alliance and requires students to obtain at least 30 ECTS credits (corresponding to one semester) at each partner university (initially in Milan, then in Warsaw, and finally in Prague, after which they may choose where to complete their final semester).

The Master's Degree Programme in Migration Studies and New Societies aims to train internationally oriented professionals capable of contributing, within public administrations, supranational and international institutions, enterprises, professional firms, third-sector organisations, and advanced research institutions, to the understanding and management of migration phenomena and cultural diversity.

In compliance with the qualifying educational objectives of the relevant degree class, the programme seeks to provide interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary competencies in the legal, economic, geopolitical, linguistic, social, anthropological, and philosophical fields. These are intended to foster the ability to critically understand and analyse the causes, implications, and prospects of migration, as well as to develop the skills necessary to contribute to the regulation and governance of migration policies, with particular reference to the European context.

Accordingly, the programme aims to provide both technical-theoretical knowledge and applied skills related to the management of migration and the integration of migrants, especially asylum seekers, into society. Graduates will be able to perform coordination and management functions in the field of migrant reception and integration and/or contribute to the design of migration governance policies within the European Union, as well as operate within public institutions, private enterprises, governmental and non-governmental organisations, and third-sector entities at both national and European levels.

More specifically, the programme aims to train:

- professionals specialised in reception and integration policies, capable of operating at both national and European levels in the design and implementation of migration management and integration policies;
- professionals capable of contributing to the formulation of migration policies and providing qualified support to local authorities, national institutions (Prefectures, Territorial Commissions for the recognition of international protection), and supranational institutions (particularly within the European Union), as well as operating within cooperatives, enterprises, and NGOs at both national and international levels.

The programme includes a common curriculum with compulsory courses across several disciplinary areas (including law, geopolitics, languages, economics, philosophy, sociology, and anthropology). Its objective is to enable students from diverse backgrounds to acquire shared competencies and analytical tools, essential for engaging with specialised subjects starting from the second semester of the first year.

Students may personalise their academic pathway by selecting from a range of specialised courses organised into different disciplinary areas and grouped into three learning pathways, respectively focused on:

- (i) Integration Migration and Policies;
- (ii) Civil Society and Integration;
- (iii) People, Space and Mobility.

In addition to the joint degree structure, cooperation with partner institutions is implemented through:

- (a) a shared educational offer, including courses delivered by faculty members from each participating university;
- (b) mandatory student mobility periods of at least 30 ECTS credits at each partner institution;
- (c) mobility opportunities for academic staff, in order, inter alia, to organise joint seminars and teaching activities, particularly during the final year.

The programme also promotes the involvement of visiting professors with specific expertise in the subject areas covered.

The structure of the programme ensures that students obtain at least 30 ECTS credits at each partner university. The first semester of the first year (30 ECTS), held in Milan, includes compulsory courses in various disciplines (law, economics, philosophy, geopolitics, language). The second semester (30 ECTS), held in Warsaw, includes three compulsory courses on migration dynamics and one elective course within the chosen learning pathway, as well as mandatory certification of digital skills (3 ECTS) and a specialised module (3 ECTS).

The first semester of the second year (30 ECTS), held in Prague, focuses on sociology and anthropology, aiming to develop critical analytical skills regarding social phenomena. During this semester, students select their specialisation track and begin preparing their thesis through a compulsory Diploma Seminar (6 ECTS).

The final semester includes a compulsory internship and the preparation of the Master's thesis (9 ECTS), preferably based on the internship experience. Internship credits (6/9 ECTS) and elective credits (12 ECTS) may also be obtained through workshops and laboratories organised with stakeholders.

With regard to internships, students are required to complete at least 6 ECTS (150 hours), with the possibility of extending the internship to obtain an additional 3 ECTS (75 hours). As an alternative, students may acquire additional language skills beyond English. International students are encouraged to acquire Italian language skills where relevant for professional opportunities in Italy.

The programme adopts an innovative and practice-oriented teaching approach, combining theoretical and practical components, encouraging active participation through seminars, simulations, and group work, and fostering intercultural dialogue among students and faculty.

Expected learning outcomes

The graduates in Migration Studies and New Societies will acquire:

a) Knowledge and understanding

- the capability to address issues related to the phenomenon of migration, thus strengthening the competencies achieved during their first cycle of studies. This unique learning pathway allows students to further develop high awareness, critical thinking and individual capacity to explore new visions, concepts, methods and tools to foster:
 - conscious decision-making processes in the promotion of migration policies and regulations;
 - the performance and coordination of tasks in the management of migration flows and the integration of migrants;
 - the capability to well-contextualize and read the phenomenon of migration through the cognitive and methodological tools of the disciplines of law, sociology, economics, language, geo-politics and anthropology;
 - multidisciplinary methodological skills in particular, of a legal, sociological, linguistic and geopolitical nature in order to deal with complex situations and to develop innovative strategies related to the integration of migrants and the promotion of their human rights, always bearing in mind the global and inter-generational dimension characterising the phenomenon of migration.

b) Applying knowledge and understanding

The graduates in Migration Studies and New Societies will be able to:

- use their skills of comprehension and management of migration and cultural diversity in the fields of public administrations, supranational and international institutions, public and private companies (especially those of a transnational nature), law firms, no-profit organisations and public and private centres of research;
- use their scientific knowledge to advance concrete strategies for the management of legal or illegal migration flows. This also entails their capacity of availing of theoretical concepts for the development of many operational aspects regarding the multidisciplinary facets of the phenomenon of migration;

- design, monitor, and evaluate actions aimed at fostering an effective, humanitarian, and safe European migration policy, in full compliance with the objectives set forth by the European Union in this area;
- adopt methodologies, techniques, tools and communication processes designed for addressing innovative, interdisciplinary and multicultural issues related to the phenomenon of migration;
- properly use the English language, both written and spoken, in an international and multicultural work environment, as well as a second language at least at a level sufficient for basic communication.

c) Making judgements

The graduates in Migration Studies and New Societies will be able to:

- take autonomous and innovative decisions, also on the basis of limited or incomplete information, in order to address the issues concerning the management of migration flows, the integration of the migrants and the related socio-cultural challenges;
- integrate the ethical dimension into decision-making processes and the application of their knowledge and skills.

In this respect, the interaction among students coming from different cultural and disciplinary backgrounds should improve decision-making and reasoning processes free from cognitive bias characterising national background.

e) Communication skills

The graduates in Migration Studies and New Societies will be able to:

- communicate in fluent English, with appropriate technical language, in an international and multicultural work environment;
- communicate (in English) to migrants coming from very different national, cultural and social backgrounds. This is thanks to the fact that enrolled students will receive an advanced training properly thought for the migration scenario. They will, moreover, be able to choose suitable topics of their interest, in order to develop comprehension and communication skills with particularly vulnerable interlocutors;
- communicate, in a clear and unambiguous manner, their knowledge and research results to specialist and non-specialist interlocutors;
- write (in English) texts, reports and projects dealing with the phenomenon of migration. This capability will be implemented through (i) the drafting of written documents; (ii) their discussion in the classroom with lecturers and the fellow students; (iii) the activities carried out during the compulsory training internship; (iv) and the drafting and discussion of the master's thesis.

f) Learning skills

The graduates in Migration Studies and New Societies will be able to:

- critically elaborate the notions and methodologies learned;
- develop a personal study-method, thus enabling them to keep up-to-date and further develop the knowledge obtained.

These skills are implemented through student-based educational experiences properly designed for empowering the student's awareness in dealing with research and work activities, in particular through (i) the discussion and the deepening in class of current issues about migration; (ii) the drafting of research papers evaluated by the lecturer(s); (iii) the in-depth study of the topics covered during the teachings and, finally, (iv) the writing of the master's thesis.

Professional profile and employment opportunities

The identification of professional opportunities is based on the analysis of the labour market and territorial needs.

In particular, the consultation with the stakeholders revealed a general interest in the integration of graduates with an in-depth knowledge of the migration phenomenon, its dynamics and issues related to the reception and integration of migrants in the field of international organizations, public administration, as well as in the field of integration and reception of migrants, but also in the private sector, in companies where the need for job placement and inclusion of the migrant person is felt.

Interest confirmed by the data concerning more generally the degree class in European studies, which show that 79% of graduates find permanent employment five years after graduation, both in the public sector and in the private sector (see Alma Laurea data, on the degree class in European studies). Unlike the other courses of the same degree class, however, the course aims, as suggested by the social partners, to develop two skills highly required by the labour market:

- a) the acquisition of communication skills, including digital, suitable for the context, accompanied by the ability to relate to the migrant in an empathic way and respectful of linguistic and cultural diversity;
- b) the acquisition of skills in the field of job orientation and human resources with skills suitable to deal with the specific situation of migrant workers.

This expertise can be made available to the private sector, as well as the public sector.

In the light of the market analysis carried out, the following professional figures are to be trained:

1) Officer in migration policies and flow management in the PA and international organizations

"Function in a work context":

The course aims to train professional figures able to contribute to the development and implementation of public intervention policies in the field of migration, reception, and management of flows. These competences are required in European and international institutions, as well as in public administrations at ministerial, regional, and local level.

"Competences associated with functions":

The interdisciplinary skills learned during the course provide the graduate with a holistic approach useful for identifying the most effective strategies to promote and implement policies in this field.

Specifically, the course aims to develop the skills required by international organizations and public administrations to implement effective policies. Particular attention is paid to the enhancement of digital, communicative, and linguistic skills with particular reference to the migration context.

In addition, thanks to the skills acquired in the course offered, the graduate can conduct research and prepare reports in relation to applicable legislation and policies.

"Career opportunities":

The expert in migration policies can find an adequate professional position, after passing any competition tests where provided, within European and international organizations, as well as state administrations (national, regional, and local), public bodies, public companies.

The course is addressed, on the one hand, to the traditional actors operating in the migration landscape, primarily international and European organizations (such as, among others, the UNHCR, the IOM, the European Commission) and national institutions (Ministry of the Interior, prefectures, territorial commissions); on the other hand, the course aims to respond to the request for new professionals competent in the management of the migration phenomenon, which can be used in public bodies (even if not specifically operating in the reception sector).

2) Operator in the field of the third sector, reception, and integration

"Function in a work context":

The course aims to train experienced operators who can operate in non-profit organizations (including non-profit organizations, NGOs, associations, and social cooperatives), established at local, national, European and international level, and in associations working in the world of hospitality and integration.

The graduate will perform functions of consultancy and design of reception paths and support in the field to the activities of the reception centers.

"Competences associated with functions":

The course aims to provide interdisciplinary, legal, sociological, psychological, anthropological linguistic skills, to prepare the graduate for the multiple challenges that the reception of the migrant poses. Thanks to the skills acquired in the course, the student will be able to face both the phases of the first reception and support for the presentation of the application for protection, and the phases that aim at integration, job placement, access to services (welfare) and the stay of the migrant. Particular attention is paid to the strengthening of linguistic and relational skills with reference to reception procedures.

"Career opportunities":

The operator can find a professional place within associations, social cooperatives, non-profit organizations, including non-profit organizations, NGOs established at local, national, European, and international level, which operate in the field of reception and integration of migrants.

3) Specialist and consultant in diversity management and job orientation

"Function in a work context":

The course aims to train professional figures in the field of job orientation and human resources with skills suitable to deal with the specific situation of migrant workers. The graduate can be employed both in the business world and in the public sector in various activities such as: job orientation, management of employment contracts, participation in union negotiations, the development of corporate welfare plans, considering the needs of migrant workers.

"Competences associated with functions":

The course aims to develop legal skills (at international, European, comparative), economic, sociological, and linguistic level for the management of the employment relationship in its different phases, for the management of personnel, individual and collective disputes with specific reference to migrant workers.

"Career opportunities":

The expert in diversity management and job orientation can find a place, both in the public sector and in the business sector, as an operator of employment services and active labour policies, as a consultant for job orientation, in the management of human resources and labour strategies.

In addition, the graduate will be able to find space as a consultant within institutions and organizations in public administrations or third sector bodies, which offer, for example, counter services. Furthermore, advice can also be carried out in the context of the profession, in favour of individuals or companies.

4) Expert on migration issues in the field of communication

"Function in a work context":

The course aims to train professional figures in the field of communication and media, with specific skills in relation to the

representation of the migration phenomenon. These skills are required both in journalism (on paper, radio, television, online), and in the field of public, institutional, and political communication. The graduate in Migration Studies and New Societies will be able to prepare informed studies and reports based on studies and research conducted with the methodologies provided by research in the social and anthropological field, to guarantee a correct representation of the migrant.

"Competences associated with functions":

The courses taught during the course aim to train methodological, linguistic, digital communication skills to study and represent the migration phenomenon in an informed, correct, aware and effective way.

"Career opportunities":

Graduates may find employment as specialists in political and institutional communication in the field of migration, within national or international institutions?subject, where applicable, to the completion of the relevant competitive selection procedures?or within third-sector organisations seeking to develop informed and responsible communication strategies on migration-related issues.

Initial knowledge required

The candidates applying for the Joint Master's Degree in Migration Studies and New Societies must:

- meet specific curricular requirements;
- be proficient in English;
- have adequate personal knowledge and background.

In particular, candidates must:

1) Hold, or obtain before 31 October 2026 at the latest, a first cycle degree (three years/bachelor = 180 ECTS), released in Italy or abroad, in other disciplines, providing that the candidate has adequate competences in at least two of the following academic fields: Political Science, Economics-Statistics, Law. For student holding an Italian first cycle degree, it implies to have acquired at least 42 ECTS in one or more of following scientific sectors, defined in accordance with national classification:

- for LAW: IUS/02 Comparative private law; IUS/08 Constitutional law; IUS/09 Public law; IUS/13 International law; IUS/14 EU law; IUS/21 Comparative public law.
- for ECONOMICS AND STATISTICS: M-GGR/02 Economic and political geography; SECS-P/01 Economics; SECS-P/02 Economic Policy; SECS-S/01 Statistics; SECS-S/03 Economic Statistics; SECS-S/04 Demography; SECS-S/05 Social Statistics.
- for POLITICAL SCIENCE: SPS/04 Political Science; SPS/07 General Sociology; SPS/08 Sociology of culture and communication; SPS/09 Economic Sociology and Sociology of work and organizations.

2) Show proficiency in English at a B2 level or higher per the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR).

The B2-level requirement will be ascertained by the University Language Centre (SLAM) upon admission as follows:

- Valid language certificate at B2 level or higher, issued no more than three years before the application date. The list of language certificates recognized by the University is available at <https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39322>. The certificate must be uploaded when submitting the online application;
- English level achieved during a University of Milan degree programme and certified by the University Language Centre (SLAM) no more than four years before the application date, including levels based on language certificates submitted by the applicant during their Bachelor's degree at the University of Milan. Verification will be carried out automatically, no documents need to be uploaded;
- Entry test administered by the University Language Centre (SLAM) according to the calendar published on the website: (<https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39267/>)

All those who fail to submit a valid certificate or do not meet the required proficiency level will be instructed during the admission procedure to take the Entry test.

Applicants who do not take or pass the Entry test will be required to obtain a language proficiency certificate recognized by the University (see <https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39322>) and deliver it to the SLAM via the InformaStudenti service by the deadline fixed for the master's programme (<https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39267/>). Applicants who do not meet the requirement by said deadline will not be admitted to the master's degree programme and may not sit any further tests

3) Have strong personal competencies.

The adequacy of the candidates' competencies is assessed by the Admissions Board:

- based on the academic performance of the candidate and consistency of the programme with her/his previous studies, professional or other relevant experiences, and career plans;
- through a personal interview to be held by the Admissions Board exclusively from remote provided that the applicant satisfies the curricular and language requirements. Applicants selected for the interview will receive a notification with all the relevant instructions (date, time, online platform to use).

The Admissions Board is composed by at least one teacher for each partner University.

Compulsory attendance

Attendance of at least 70% of classes is compulsory for all taught courses. Motivated exceptions and waivers may be requested to the Didactic Board in exceptional circumstances.

Internship criteria

Students are required to complete an internship consistent with the learning objectives of the programme.

Internships may be undertaken either in Italy or abroad.

While students are expected to identify internship opportunities that align with their individual interests and professional aspirations, the Programme may assist them in this process by disseminating information on relevant opportunities, including those specifically reserved for students enrolled in the Master's programme.

A compulsory internship is required for 6 ECTS credits, corresponding to 150 hours of work. Students may choose to extend the duration of their internship in order to obtain an additional 3 ECTS credits (equivalent to 75 hours).

Alternatively, instead of extending the internship, students may acquire the corresponding 3 ECTS credits by undertaking equivalent activities, such as participation in workshops organised in cooperation with stakeholders or engagement in field research activities. As an additional option, students may also acquire further language competences beyond proficiency in English.

The workload associated with the internship is calculated according to the standard equivalence of 25 hours = 1 ECTS credit. Internship activities may be carried out within institutions, companies, or public and private organisations, as well as through participation in workshops offered by the partner universities in collaboration with external stakeholders.

Degree programme final exams

Once earned at least 105 credits for the learning activities included in his/her study plan, a student may be admitted to undertake the final exam leading to the award of the Joint Master's degree.

A total of 15 credits are reserved to the design, preparation and writing up of the master's dissertation. The preparation

includes the attendance of a Diploma Seminar at the Charles University, which is aimed at providing students with methods and research tools. The dissertation must be an original piece of work of an adequate level of originality and persuasiveness, written by the candidate under the supervision of one Professor of the Programme. It elaborates on a topic covered by the programme and should preferably be developed in connection with the work done during the internship.

The formal assignment of 15 ECTS can only take place when the dissertation is completed, publicly discussed and when the final exam is passed.

A final graduation mark is assigned by the Graduation Board. It takes into account the student's academic performance (average marks) and the assessment of the final exam

Campus

The lessons of the Master's degree in Migration Studies and New Societies are carried out in person and are mainly organised in seminars, following a student-centered approach and using innovative teaching methods (e.g.: flipped classroom, laboratory teaching, clinics, case-studies, etc.), in full accordance with the guidelines issued by the "4EU+ European University Alliance" programme.

The schedule and the venue of the courses will be shared with students at the beginning of each semester and published also on the website of the partner Universities - Charles University (Prague) and University of Warsaw.

The number of examination sessions depends on the administrative rules of each of the partner university. In any case, a minimum of five sessions distributed in different periods of the academic year is generally expected.

Notes

Among the electives, those who do not hold an Italian high school diploma or degree can obtain 3 credits in Additional language skills: Italian by demonstrating A2 level in Italian per the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). This level can be assessed in one of the following ways:

- by submitting a certificate of A2 or higher level issued no more than three years prior to the date of submission. You will find the list of language certificates recognized by the University at: <https://www.unimi.it/en/node/349/>). The language certificate must be uploaded through <http://studente.unimi.it/uploadCertificazioniLingue> ;

- by an entry-level test administrated by SLAM that can be taken only once and is compulsory for all students who do not have a valid language certificate. Those who fail to reach A2 level will have to attend one or more than one 60-hour Italian course(s) geared to their level. Those who do not take the entry-level test or fail to pass the end-of-course test after six attempts will have to obtain language certification privately in order to earn the 3 credits of Additional language skills: Italian. As an alternative, they can modify their course programme by choosing a different elective.

With regard to the demonstration of digital competences, students are required to attend the course organised by the University of Warsaw during the second semester of the first academic year and to obtain the final certification issued upon successful completion of the course.

EXPERIENCE OF STUDY ABROAD AS PART OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

Students are required to complete an internship consistent with the learning objectives of the programme.

Internships may be undertaken either in Italy or abroad.

While students are expected to identify internship opportunities that align with their individual interests and professional aspirations, the Programme may assist them in this process by disseminating information on relevant opportunities, including those specifically reserved for students enrolled in the Master's programme.

A compulsory internship is required for 6 ECTS credits, corresponding to 150 hours of work. Students may choose to extend the duration of their internship in order to obtain an additional 3 ECTS credits (equivalent to 75 hours).

Study and internships abroad

The Master's degree in Migration Studies and New Societies offers experiences of student-mobility of the duration necessary to get the 30 ECTS at each of the partner universities.

In order to ensure a great and effective support for students, this Master Degree has been structured following all the requirements provided by the Erasmus+ Guidelines for the Erasmus Mundus Joint Master's Degrees. During the time required for obtaining the EMJM grants, students may rely on Erasmus+ scholarships, allocated on the basis of the specific agreements concluded with the partner universities involved the 4EU+ European University Alliance (<https://www.unimi.it/en/international/university-milan-world/international-agreements>), which may be supplemented by the University funding for disadvantaged students.

It is therefore expected that students will spend at least one of the four semesters at each of the partner universities. The University of Milan dedicates special services, including front office services, for the students attending the international programs, such as the Master's Degree in Migration Studies and New Societies (International Mobility and Promotion Office; Front office Erasmus Desks in different areas). Highly qualified administrative staff, with specific expertise both on disciplinary areas and on individual mobility programs and initiatives, may help students in dealing with all the issues related to student-mobility.

As already told, then, the course provides for the achievement of a Joint Degree. At the end of their studies, the students will obtain a single diploma for the three universities, which will indicate, for each country, the reference degree class (for Italy the LM-90 – Studi europei).

How to participate in Erasmus mobility programs

The students of the University of Milan can participate in mobility programmes, through a public selection procedure.

Ad hoc commissions will evaluate:

- Academic career
- the candidate's proposed study programme abroad
- is/her foreign language proficiency
- the reasons behind his/her application

Call for applications and informative meetings

The public selection for Erasmus+ mobility for study generally begins around February each year with the publication of a call for applications specifying destinations and requirements. Regarding the Erasmus+ Mobility for Traineeship, the University of Milan usually publishes two calls a year enabling students to choose a destination defined by an inter-institutional agreement or to find a traineeship position on their own.

The University organises informative meetings to illustrate mobility opportunities and rules for participation.

Erasmus+ scholarship

The European Union grants the winners of the Erasmus+ programme selection a scholarship to contribute to their mobility costs, which may be supplemented by the University funding for disadvantaged students.

Language courses

Students who pass the selections for mobility programmes can benefit from intensive foreign language courses offered each year by the University Language Centre (SLAM).
