CHARACTERISTICS OF DEGREE PROGRAMME

General and specific learning objectives

- 1 .The First Level Philosophy Course has only one curriculum. Aim of the course is to give a basic although solid knowledge of the main historical lines of the philosophical and scientific thought, the different aspects of philosophical research and appropriate critical and methodological tools. In line with the Milano University School of Philosophy tradition, the concern for a rigorous historical-philosophical approach meets the interest in contemporary philosophy, with a major interest in moral, theoretical and epistemological topics.
2. Standing the acquisition of a good philosophical formation, the First Level Philosophy Course, because of its interdisciplinary approach, aims at offering to the students the possibility of pursuing their own line of study also in other humanistic and scientific departments.

Expected learning outcomes

The First Level Philosophy Course aims at offering to the students the possibility to be acquainted with the proper knowledge on the historical development of philosophical concepts and the main theoretical, moral, esthetical, logical, epistemological and linguistic topics. Moreover, it allows the students to master reading and understanding of original and translated texts, and the different analytical and argumentative ways of the philosophical discourse.

General and specific teaching activities are finalized to obtain these goals. Students are required to attend the following classes:

- Philosophical tradition, most important items and authors and methodological aspects of historical-philosophical research
- Theoretical and conceptual analysis and research on funding topics
- Philosophical and scientific issues dealing with the phenomenology of perception
- Ethical issues in modern and contemporary debates

- Philosophy of Science
- Logic, Philosophy of Language and Philosophy of Mind

Professional profile and employment opportunities

The First Level Philosophy Course warrants the access to either the Second Level Philosophical Sciences Course or the Second Level Course preparing for teaching in secondary schools. Moreover, it provides the required competences for working in the domains of:

- Communication
- Cultural formation
- Publishing houses and Editorial offices
- Multi-medial cultural promotion
- Organisation and planning in public and private Administration

Notes

In order to get their degree, students are required to certify their knowledge of the English language at the B1 level. This level can be certified in one of the following ways:

- By submitting their language certificate, taken no more than 3 years before its submittal and attesting a B1 or higher level (for the list of the language certificates which are accepted by the University of Milan, please refer to the website: <http://www.unimi.it/studenti/100312.htm>).

Students can submit their language certificate during the immatriculation procedure or send it to the Language Centre of the University of Milan (SLAM) via the Infostudente service.

- By sitting the placement test run by SLAM, during the first year exclusively, from September to December. Should they not pass the Placement Test, students will have to attend the English language course organized by SLAM. All students who do not have a valid language certificate must sit the Placement Test. Those students who do not sit the Placement test by December or do not pass the end of course test in one of the 6 attempts granted will have to get a language certificate outside the University of Milan within their degree.

EXPERIENCE OF STUDY ABROAD AS PART OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

The University of Milan supports the international mobility of its students, offering them the opportunity to spend periods of study and training abroad, a unique opportunity to enrich their curriculum in an international context.

Study and internships abroad

The Department of Philosophy entertains Erasmus exchanges with European universities since more than ten years, inviting students to take advantage of them. In the last few years, the Erasmus announcement is published in the web site of the Department and is presented to the students in a meeting organized by the Erasmus Department Coordinator where the different opportunities and areas of research are presented. As the number of universities sharing an exchange with the Department is remarkable, all philosophical areas are covered by the different universities: History of Philosophy, Theoretic Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Aesthetics, Philosophy of language, Logic and Philosophy of Science. Moreover, many universities offer non-philosophical courses to the students.

The number of students applying to the Erasmus exchange is doubly greater than the available scholarships. The candidates are selected considering their motivation, their academic career and their foreign language proficiency. The commission evaluating the students is made up of professors working at the Department of Philosophy.

The successful candidates fulfil the Learning Agreement with the Erasmus Department Coordinator and discuss with her any change of it by e-mail while they are abroad. The students who send the Learning Agreement to the Erasmus Department Coordinator by e-mail receive it back with the Coordinator's electronic signature and they can ask their hosting university to countersign before returning to Italy.

When the students are back to Italy, their successfully passed exams (documented by the Transcript of records) are converted into Italian exams according to the Learning Agreement; the exam conversions and the relative marks are submitted for approval to the Philosophy Didactic Board.

How to participate in Erasmus mobility programs

To gain access to mobility programs for study purposes, lasting 3-12 months, the enrolled students of the University of Milan must attend a public selection that starts usually around the month of February each year through the presentation of specific competition announcements, which contain information on available destinations, respective duration of the mobility, requirements and deadlines for submitting the online application.

The selection, aimed at evaluating the proposed study abroad program of the candidate, knowledge of a foreign language, especially when this is a preferential requirement, and the motivations behind the request, is performed by specially constituted commissions.

Each year, before the expiry of the competition announcements, the University organises information sessions for the specific study course or groups of study courses, in order to illustrate to students the opportunities and participation rules.

To finance stays abroad under the Erasmus + program, the European Union assigns to the selected students a scholarship that - while not covering the full cost of living abroad - is a useful contribution for additional costs as travel costs or greater cost of living in the country of destination.

The monthly amount of the communitarian scholarship is established annually at national level; additional contributions may be provided to students with disabilities.

In order to enable students in economic disadvantaged conditions to participate in Erasmus+ program, the University of Milan assigns further additional contributions; amount of this contributions and criteria for assigning them are established from year to year.

The University of Milan promotes the linguistic preparation of students selected for mobility programs, organising every year intensive courses in the following languages: English, French, German and Spanish.

The University in order to facilitate the organisation of the stay abroad and to guide students in choosing their destination offers a specific support service.
