CHARACTERISTICS OF DEGREE PROGRAMME

General and specific learning objectives

The goal of the Master's degree programme in Music, theatre, and film is to train graduates with a specific set of skills, both theoretical and technical, as well as a set of methods and operational techniques, relating to historical phenomena, and contemporary developments of cultural heritage, and communication through music, theatre, and film, viewed as the totality of the various components that come to fruition as one artistic whole. Given its dual nature as both theory and practice, the degree programme also aims to provide far-reaching but thorough training in the methodology and its application. Graduates will be in a position to assume a leadership role as an industry professional.

Expected learning outcomes

The degree programme aims to have its graduates acquire: an in-depth understanding of music, theatre, and film history; its modes and channels of distribution/dissemination; a strong foundation in linguistics, philology, and history; the skill to use the leading IT tools for musical, theatrical, and film publishing, as well as technological supports for digital composition, performance, and literature, and for musicological analysis; a set of techniques and experiences drawn on the different professional arenas within the disciplines of theatre, music, and film (history, pedagogy, technology, IT, conservation, publishing, journalism, production, etc.) in which the student hopes to specialise. Graduates must therefore be able to critically apply such knowledge and skill from both an analytical/critical and an academic perspective. They should also be able to design and produce works of art, demonstrate a high level of ability in event conception, planning, and production,

and manage theatres, cinemas, and related facilities. Students should have the aptitude to market performing-arts events in a tailored and conscientious way. Students must furthermore be able to use the leading audiovisual, IT, and online-communication tools for purposes of documentation, scientific study, communication (relating to music, theatre, and film), as well as for purposes of designing and generating effective artistic synergies amongst next-generation performance modes, and electronic media.

Finally, those earning a Master's degree in Music, theatre, and film will be able to speak and write English fluently, and to use English in terms of music and theatre terminology.

Professional profile and employment opportunities

The level of specialised knowledge and skills reached will allow graduates of the Master's degree programme in Music, theatre, and film to find high-level employment at institutions in the public and private sector, libraries, archives (whether hard copy, sound, or audio-visual), museums and organological and discographic collections, as well as through production houses (theatres, recording studios, and concert venues), at institutions operating in the field of communication and live performance, in the field of cultural-dissemination, or within publishing (traditional or multimedia), as well as work in entities and businesses howsoever connected to music, theatre, and film (film libraries). Graduates may go into business for themselves in these fields. They may also find employment in print media, radio / tv, or multimedia, or specialise as a theatre critic or historian, or become a researcher for the film or audiovisual industry. Graduates who have earned a Master's degree may also work in the field of event conception, planning, and production specifically for music, theatre, and film. They may also specialise (insofar as the currently in-flux statutory and regulatory framework allows) to teach music, musicology, and performing-arts studies at a university, conservatory, or secondary school.

The training of the graduate of this Master's degree programme may, furthermore, represent the launchpad for other academic paths as university scholars and researchers (PhDs).

At the end of the programme, a Master's degree in Music, theatre, and film studies (Master's degree in Musicology and musical heritage – LM 45) is awarded.

Notes

A minimum English language proficiency at level B1 within the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR)

The English level B1 is assessed by the University Language Centre SLAM throughout the admission process in the following ways:

- language certificate achieved no more than three years prior to the submission, at level B1 or higher, recognised by the University (the list of recognised language certificates can be found at: https://www.unimi.it/en/study/language-proficiency/placement-tests-entry-tests-and-english-courses). The language certificate must be uploaded during the admission process;
- B1 level or higher assessed by SLAM during the bachelor's degrees obtained at the University of Milan. English levels B1 or higher achieved no more than four years previously are deemed valid. The verification is automatic with no need to attach any certificate during the application phase;
- entry test, organised by SLAM, which will take place on May 7th or September 11th 2020 at room 700, Via Giuseppe Colombo 46 from 9am to 6pm. If the language certificate or level is not valid, the candidate will be summoned for one of the entry tests through the admission procedure.

Candidates who fail the entry test B1 will not be admitted to the master's degree programme and cannot take further tests.

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To obtain the degree, students are required to demonstrate an English language proficiency at level B2 within the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). This level can be assessed in the following ways:

- the language certificate at level B2 or higher, already uploaded during the admission process;
- B1 level or higher assessed by SLAM during the bachelor's degrees obtained at the University of Milan, already assessed during the admission process;
- B2 level or higher assessed during the entry-level test;
- B2 level or higher assessed during the Placement Test organised by SLAM during the first year, from October to January. Students who do not attain a B2 level will have to attend an English course organised by SLAM during the second II semester of the first year.

Students who do not attend the course or fail the SLAM end-of-course test within six attempts will have to obtain a language certificate.

EXPERIENCE OF STUDY ABROAD AS PART OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

The University of Milan supports international mobility by providing its students with the opportunity to spend study and internship periods abroad. It is a unique chance to enrich your educational path in a new exciting environment.

The agreements entered into by the University with over 300 universities from the 27 EU member countries and other Extra-EU countries under the European Erasmus+ programme allow regularly enrolled students to carry out part of their studies at one of the partner universities or to undertake internships at companies, training and research centres and other organizations.

Similar international mobility opportunities are provided outside Europe, through agreements with a number of prestigious institutions.

Study and internships abroad

The degree programme provides its students with specific Erasmus+ opportunities at European universities in France, the United Kingdom, Germany, Spain, plus a university in Poland and a university in Portugal where courses are taught in English. Available locations: Leopold-Franzens-Universität Innsbruck; Universität Wien - Institut fur Musikwissenschaft; Université d'Avignon et des Pays de Vaucluse; Université de la Sorbonne Nouvelle Paris III; Université de Paris Sorbonne - Paris IV UFR de Musique et Musicologie; Université François Rabelais Tours; Johann-Wolfgang-Goethe-Universität Frankfurt am Main - Institut fur Musikwissenschaft; Uniwersytet Łodzky- Institute of Theory of Literature, Theatre and Audiovisual Art; Universidade Nova de Lisboa; Cardiff University - School of Music; University of Strathclyde Glasgow; Universidad de Valladolid. For each location, Erasmus outgoing students have options ranging from 3 to 10 months, during which they can follow courses and take exams that will be recognized as an integral part of the degree programme. They can also combine this activity with research for the preparation of their Master's thesis, which will count towards the number of credits covered by the Erasmus scholarship. Every year, all teaching activities included in the programme are presented to interested students by the Erasmus manager in a specific informative meeting. The data and educational information required for submitting the Learning Agreement are also collected in special information sheets posted to the Erasmus page of the Faculty of Humanities (https://www.unimi.it/it/internazionale/studiareallestero/partire-con-erasmus/come-partecipare/erasmus-aree/erasmus-studi-umanistici).

If you are and incoming Erasmus student, you can attend all classes in Italian. If you wish, you can agree with individual instructors on a programme partly or entirely in English. Moreover, teaching staff exchange agreements are in place with many partner universities, including visiting professor programmes for our faculty members abroad and for foreign colleagues at our institution, within the programmes of the Department of Cultural and Environmental Heritage.

How to participate in Erasmus mobility programs

The students of the University of Milan can participate in mobility programmes, through a public selection procedure. Ad hoc commissions will evaluate:

- Academic career
- the candidate's proposed study programme abroad
- his/her foreign language proficiency
- the reasons behind his/her application

Call for applications and informative meetings

The public selection generally begins around February each year with the publication of a call for applications specifying the destinations, with the respective programme duration (from 2/3 to 12 months), requirements and online application deadline.

Every year, before the deadline for the call, the University organizes informative meetings to illustrate opportunities and rules for participation to students.

Erasmus+ scholarship

The European Union grants the winners of the Erasmus+ programme selection a scholarship to contribute to their mobility costs, which is supplemented by the University funding for disadvantaged students.

Language courses

Students who pass the selections for mobility programmes can benefit from intensive foreign language courses offered each year by the University.

Students also have the following options:

- 9 credits to be allocated to other electives amongst those offered by the University of Milan, or to take a second year's course in a subject area, to be arranged with the instructor, of classes completed during the Bachelor's degree programme;
- 9 credits to be allocated to an educational workshop in music and performance, or to a workshop or internship in a performing-arts or music-related field.

By the end of the first academic year, students must decide on the topic for their Master's degree thesis in coordination with an instructor from an eligible subject within the degree programme. Together, student and instructor must develop a plan for the sequence of student-chosen coursework.

Once the required 93 academic credits have been earned as required by these rules, the student will be eligible for the final				
examination to earn their Master's degree.
