CHARACTERISTICS OF DEGREE PROGRAMME

General and specific learning objectives

The degree course in Humanities aims to provide students with a solid and in-depth foundational, methodological, and historical education in literary, philological, and linguistic disciplines, spanning from ancient times to the Latin and Romance Middle Ages, and up to the modern and contemporary eras.

At the same time, it aims to enable students to produce, understand, and critically analyze texts and documents of various types, making them fully aware of the correlation these have with their context of production and circulation.

Alongside the purely literary, philological, and linguistic disciplines, the educational path ensures space for a range of

historical, geographical, philosophical, artistic, and archaeological disciplines, which allow students to broaden their knowledge and enrich their profile in various directions.

Expected learning outcomes

Knowledge and understanding

The study program aims to ensure a solid knowledge of literary and linguistic systems with reference to the historical, geographical, and artistic context; mastery of the techniques and critical tools necessary to methodically understand and analyze ancient, medieval, modern, and contemporary texts and documents in their original languages; a solid and conscious written and oral command of the Italian language; and proficiency in bibliographic research procedures.

Knowledge and understanding are acquired through lectures, which typically include both introductory notions regarding the subject being taught and monographic in-depth studies as models, as well as through the study of relevant bibliography.

The assessment of knowledge and understanding is carried out through exams (oral or written) with grades out of thirty; for laboratory activities, through an assessment test with a approved/not approved judgment.

Applying knowledge and understanding

Graduates in Literature will be able to apply the following knowledge and skills:

- Knowledge of the structure, grammar, and history of the Italian and Latin languages (and Greek for the Ancient Sciences curriculum)
- Ability to understand and critically analyze texts and documents
- Ability to relate linguistic and literary documents to the historical and cultural context that produced them
- Knowledge of methods and strategies for analyzing literary texts
- In-depth knowledge in curricular disciplines. For the Ancient Sciences curriculum: literature, languages, history, and archaeology of the period and relevant geo-cultural areas; for the Modern Literature curriculum: medieval literature and languages, modern and contemporary Italian literature and language, framed within their historical, critical, and theoretical contexts, and connected with other forms of cultural expression of the time
- High proficiency in written and oral expression in Italian
- Ability to draft texts of various types and functions
- Ability to critically manage information (selecting and reworking texts and data, evaluating their relevance and reliability)
- Ability to critically use bibliographic and IT tools in specific areas of expertise
- Knowledge of the English language (level B1)

The ability to apply knowledge and understanding is acquired through lectures, laboratories, seminars, and exercises. The assessment of the ability to apply knowledge and understanding is carried out through exams (oral or written) with grades out of thirty; for laboratory activities, through an assessment test with a approved/not approved judgment.

The overall assessment of the ability to apply what has been learned in the various courses is carried out through the preparation and writing of the final thesis.

Making judgements

Graduates will be able to independently evaluate documents and written texts with critical tools, through the study of sources and historical and communicative contexts. They will be able to integrate the knowledge acquired in different courses, select documentation, independently use methodological tools, and coherently elaborate analytical results in a critical discussion.

Digital skills are an essential component for an active awareness of the current cultural function of technology.

Autonomy of judgment is acquired through lectures, laboratories, seminars, and exercises. The assessment of the acquisition of autonomy of judgment is carried out through written and/or oral exams and through the evaluation of the final thesis.

Communication skills

Graduates will be able to express themselves with full mastery of written and spoken Italian, being aware of its different varieties and registers; to draft a written text that is formally and substantively effective; to use digital tools to navigate the study of cultural heritage and the interaction processes between the humanities and various professional fields with agility and critical awareness; and to communicate in written and spoken English.

Communication skills are acquired through lectures, laboratories, seminars, and exercises. The assessment of the acquisition of communication skills is carried out through exams and the final thesis.

Making judgementst

Graduates will be able to continue their studies in subsequent cycles and pursue autonomous learning in various fields. This is supported by training aimed at developing a critical mindset; acquiring methodologies for analyzing literary, epigraphic, numismatic, archaeological, and papyrological sources; decoding and interpreting texts and documents; and mastering bibliographic research.

Learning abilities are acquired through lectures, laboratories, seminars, and exercises. The assessment of the acquisition of learning abilities is carried out through oral or written exams, participation in laboratories, and the evaluation of the final thesis.

Professional profile and employment opportunities

Graduates in Humanities are a valuable resource in all sectors that require cultural sensitivity, analytical and synthesis skills, and the ability to develop original and creative solutions. The specific skills and knowledge acquired during the course of study will enable them to perform tasks in professional fields where mastery of the Italian language, effective writing skills, knowledge of cultural and literary heritage, literary and linguistic knowledge, critical information management skills, and

digital skills for cultural activities are required.

These fields are very broad and diverse, both in the public and private sectors, starting with those related to publishing, journalism, cultural promotion, and event organization. Graduates in Humanities will also be able to access related master's degrees and first-level master's programs.

Initial knowledge required

Admission requirements

Applicants to the degree programme must:

- hold an upper secondary-school diploma or an equivalent qualification obtained abroad
- have an adequate educational background in the following subjects: Italian, history, Latin and, for those who intend to enrol on antiquities studies, Greek. Good general knowledge is also required.

Admission assessment

Admission to the programme is subject to a mandatory, non-selective self-assessment test.

The University uses the TOLC-SU test administered by the Cisia Consortium.

Additional learning requirements (OFA)

Additional Learning Requirement (OFA) for Latin

Students are required to have basic proficiency in Latin in order to fulfil their Latin OFA and be allowed to register for the following exams: Latin Literature; Romance Philology (advanced); Italian Literature (advanced); Italian Modern and Contemporary Literature; History of Italian Language.

Proficiency in Latin can be proved as follows:

- by submitting the CUSL-USR Latin Language Certificate attesting A2 or higher level to SLAM - University of Milan Language Centre via InformaStudenti, category 'Language test'. Please note that the certificate must have been issued no more than 3 years before the date of submission;
- by taking the basic Latin test delivered by SLAM during year I only (between October and December).

The basic Latin test is mandatory for all students who do not have a valid language certificate.

Students who fail to demonstrate basic proficiency in Latin will have to fulfil an Additional Learning Requirement (Obbligo Formativo Aggiuntivo - OFA) by attending the Latin course for beginners organised by SLAM and passing the end-of-course test. Attendance to the course is mandatory.

Those who do not sit the basic Latin test between October and December will be automatically enrolled in the mandatory course delivered by SLAM. No exemptions will be granted.

Compulsory attendance

Attending courses is strongly recommended. However, each course offers an ad-hoc syllabus for non-attending students.

Degree programme final exams

The final exam, corresponding to 9 ECTS, is based on the writing of a long paper which is assessed by an appointed committee and, as a rule, presented and discussed by the student before the committee. The final paper is compiled by the candidate under the supervision of an academic tutor ("relatore di tesi") and, generally, deals with a topic selected within the courses attended by the student and coherent with the objectives of the programme. Candidates are expected to be able to demonstrate the ability to selectively organise texts and documents, apply the correct methods of analysis, critically develop their arguments in an autonomous and personal fashion, present the results of their research adequately and with the appropriate language.

Notes

For-credit assessment B1

In order to obtain their degree, students must be proficient in English at a B1 level under the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). This proficiency level may be certified as follows:

- By submitting a language certificate attesting B1 or higher level in English and issued no more than three years before the date of submission. You will find the list of language certificates recognized by the University at: (<https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39322>). The certificate must be uploaded during the enrolment procedure, or subsequently to the portal <http://studente.unimi.it/uploadCertificazioniLingue>;
- By taking a placement test offered by the University Language Centre (SLAM) between October and December of the first year. Students who fail the test will be required to take a SLAM course.

The placement test is mandatory for all those who do not hold a valid certificate attesting to B1 or higher level.

Those who have not taken the placement test by the end of December or fail the end-of-course exam six times must obtain the necessary certification privately before graduating.

Computer skills

Students who are supposed to earn 3 credits (CFU) for basic computer skills, as provided by their degree programme, have to attend the 'Computer Science Course' through the e-learning platform of the project '3CFU Informatica' accessible at the following link: <https://3cfuinformatica.unimi.it>.

It is a blended course with a compulsory final exam.

The first exam session is scheduled for January, and more will follow according to a calendar to be made available on the course delivery platform.

The Computer Science Course 3CFU course is managed by the CTU - Teaching and Learning Innovation and Multimedia Technology Centre.

EXPERIENCE OF STUDY ABROAD AS PART OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

The University of Milan supports international mobility by providing its students with the opportunity to spend study and internship periods abroad. It is a unique chance to enrich your educational path in a new exciting environment. The agreements entered into by the University with over 300 universities from the 27 EU member countries under the European Erasmus+ programme allow regularly enrolled students to carry out part of their studies at one of the partner universities or to undertake internships at companies, training and research centres and other organisations.

Similar international mobility opportunities are provided outside Europe, through agreements with a number of prestigious institutions.

The University of Milan is a member of the 4EU+ European University Alliance that brings together eight public multidisciplinary universities: University of Milan, Charles University of Prague, Heidelberg University, Paris-Panthéon-Assas University, Sorbonne University of Paris, University of Copenhagen, University of Geneva, and University of Warsaw. The 4EU+ Alliance offers integrated educational pathways and programmes to promote the international mobility of students (physical, blended and virtual).

Study and internships abroad

The Department supports students' international mobility, through:

- Erasmus+ 'call for study': thanks to agreements signed by the Department with some UE Universities (Croatia, Estonia, France, Germany, Greece, Poland, Czech republic, Spain, Hungary, to which Swiss confederation and United Kingdom must be added), students can apply for about 40 fellowships. Funding allows students for study-abroad experiences (courses and exams) that will be recognized by Unimi, if they comply with the 'learning agreement' that must be signed before departure and approved by the Department's Erasmus committee.

- Erasmus+ 'Traineeship': funding allows students to do traineeships based at UE academic or research institutions (Swiss confederation included). Applicants to the Summer call should identify a host institution autonomously, whereas the Fall call offers traineeships based on the agreements signed by Unimi, among which some are offered by the Department.

How to participate in Erasmus mobility programs

How to participate in Erasmus+ mobility programmes

The students of the University of Milan can participate in mobility programmes, through a public selection procedure.

Ad hoc commissions will evaluate:

- Academic career
- the candidate's proposed study programme abroad
- his/her foreign language proficiency
- the reasons behind his/her application

Call for applications and informative meetings

The public selection for Erasmus+ mobility for study generally begins around February each year with the publication of a call for applications specifying destinations and requirements. Regarding the Erasmus+ Mobility for Traineeship, the University of Milan usually publishes two calls a year enabling students to choose a destination defined by an inter-institutional agreement or to find a traineeship position on their own.

The University organises informative meetings to illustrate mobility opportunities and rules for participation.

Erasmus+ scholarship

The European Union grants the winners of the Erasmus+ programme selection a scholarship to contribute to their mobility costs, which may be supplemented by the University funding for disadvantaged students.

Language courses

Students who pass the selections for mobility programmes can benefit from intensive foreign language courses offered each year by the University Language Centre (SLAM). <https://www.unimi.it/en/node/8/>

WARNING: Some courses are activated for only 6 ECTS, and can therefore be selected only in this form. Most of the courses are activated for 9 ECTS and can be selected both for 9 ECTS, when provided in the options, and for 6 ECTS only, with a partial program indicated in the syllabus. It is also possible to select these courses for 6 ECTS, but take the exam on the complete 9 ECTS course by adding 3 ECTS electives to the 6 ECTS. The same applies to any non-compulsory 12 ECTS courses.

Moreover, the student must earn 6 ECTS (3 + 3) in other training activities, which are assessed with a pass or fail score. These credits can be earned through 1) the workshops proposed or approved by the degree programme, 2) internships, 3) further language assessment (<https://www.unimi.it/it/studiare/competenzelinguistiche/altre-lingue-test-e-corsi/studi-umanistici-accertamento-della-conoscenza-di-lingua-francese-spagnola-e-tedesca3-cfu>), 4) soft skills courses (<https://www.unimi.it/en/study/bachelor-and-master-study/following-your-programme-study/soft-skills>).

As a rule, at least one of the activities should belong to the first group.

The student also has 15 ECTS available for electives. These credits can be allocated to in-depth study of subjects already included in the study plan, within the maximum number of credits awarded by these courses, or they can be allocated to courses other than those included in the study the plan.

Most of the courses are activated for 9 ECTS and can be selected both for 9 ECTS, when provided in the options, and for 6 ECTS only, with a partial program indicated in the syllabus. It is also possible to select these courses for 6 ECTS, but take the exam on the complete 9 ECTS course by adding 3 ECTS electives to the 6 ECTS. The same applies to any non-compulsory 12 ECTS courses.	
Moreover, the student must earn 6 ECTS (3 + 3) in other training activities, which are assessed with a pass or fail score. These credits can be earned through 1) the workshops proposed or approved by the degree programme, 2) internships, 3) further language assessment (https://www.unimi.it/it/studiare/competenzelinguistiche/altre-lingue-test-e-corsi/studi-umanistici-accertamento-della-conoscenza-di-lingua-francese-spagnola-e-tedesca3-cfu), 4) soft skills courses (https://www.unimi.it/en/study/bachelor-and-master-study/following-your-programme-study/soft-skills). As a rule, at least one of the activities should belong to the first group.	
The student also has 15 ECTS available for electives. These credits can be allocated to in-depth study of subjects already included in the study plan, within the maximum number of credits awarded by these courses, or they can be allocated to courses other than those included in the study the plan.
