CHARACTERISTICS OF DEGREE PROGRAMME

General and specific learning objectives

This Bachelor's degree programme aims to provide students with a general but solid knowledge of history, enabling them to develop a sense of the historical dimension of phenomena, processes and structures of reality. Students will gain an overall understanding of historiographical trends and languages in the various eras, underpinned by the ability to use the main tools for the analysis and interpretation of documents and sources, including digital humanities tools. Throughout their three years of study, they will develop their critical thinking skills in historical research, and learn how to approach analogue and digital

sources and documents.

Moreover, the programme intends to develop students' ability to communicate in English (level B1 of the CEFR), as well as basic IT skills. Lastly, the programme includes workshops and/or internships, seminars and other learning activities organised in the frame of courses and workshops, e.g. visits to archives and museums, or bibliographic research on specific topics.

Expected learning outcomes

KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING

By the end of the programme, graduates are expected to be able to understand and analyse complex situations, and to have knowledge and understanding of historical sources and the critical literature. To this end, the knowledge and understanding acquired will enable graduates to:

- analyse, interpret and critically evaluate various types of written, iconographic, material, audiovisual and multimedia sources, identifying their specific purpose;
- analyse and compare different historiographical trends;
- argue a position, by using studies and sources to develop well-grounded interpretations;
- map out different interpretations of complex phenomena, framing them in the appropriate historiographical categories and paying special attention to geography;
- conduct bibliographic research by taking into special account the type of materials collected (analogue or digital) and their reliability;
- master the vocabulary and concepts of general history and its subfields;
- have a chronological and thematic overview of scientific and technological developments, as well as of the evolution of thought, arts and cultural models within our society;
- understand phenomena also from the perspective of gender relations as they have changed and developed through time.

APPLYING KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING

Graduates will be able to communicate the results of their analyses by using appropriate language. More specifically, they will be able to apply knowledge and understanding across all stages of their research, achieving the following learning objectives:

- an understanding of the fundamental aspects of the main events and phenomena of the past;
- an understanding of the causes and effects of complex situations;
- an understanding of the dynamics of the production world and the development of social phenomena;
- familiarity with methods and tools for the interpretation of documents;
- mastery of the tools available nowadays (including digital resources) to critically understand current historiographical trends and languages, as much as to rapidly orient one's research;
- digital humanities skills, e.g. navigating websites which can be useful for historical research ? OPAC catalogues, State Archives websites, the Dizionario Biografico degli italiani (Biographical Dictionary of the Italians) ? and analysing document collections (corpora) available in the University multimedia libraries and on the web;
- team working skills, including the ability to work in an interdisciplinary team.

MAKING JUDGEMENTS

Drawing on their understanding of history as well as on the methodological and analytical skills acquired during the study programme, graduates will be able to further their knowledge of specific topics on their own, and to conduct research by making comparisons and distinctions based on their own rational thinking.

COMMUNICATION SKILLS

Graduates will have the knowledge and skills needed to illustrate different topics related to historical studies, both orally and in writing. They will be able to do that also in a digital environment, by relying on their command of digital humanities skills (surfing websites, consulting library and archival catalogues and repositories, browsing newspapers and journals, writing short informative texts, etc.).

LEARNING SKILLS

The programme provides students with the methods and notions necessary to continue their education in historical studies, or in other research fields where a solid grounding in history is crucial. More specifically, graduates will be able to expand their knowledge by consulting bibliographic materials and documents, sorting through online databases and information, and cultivating their sensitivity to historical events and the theme of memory. This will enable them to disseminate the knowledge acquired during their studies in appropriate settings, with a view to facilitating an understanding of the main historical problems of past and present societies.

Professional profile and employment opportunities

Employment opportunities are mostly linked to the ability to consult bibliographic material and documents, to browse databases and other information available on the web, and to cultivate a sensitivity to historical events and the theme of memory, as developed by graduates over the course of the programme. This will enable graduates to disseminate the knowledge acquired during their studies in appropriate settings, with a view to facilitating an understanding of the main historical problems of past and present societies.

Possible job profiles after graduation are described here below.

- CULTURAL HERITAGE OPERATORS (working for archives, libraries, museums, research and documentation centres)
Job functions include the organisation, inventory, cataloguing and valorisation of sources for historical research, as well as the promotion of the Italian culture abroad, across the many segments of the cultural industry. For operators working in administrative roles, responsibilities also include a correct and efficient management of paper and electronic document flows.

Professionals working in this field have the ability to read, analyse and describe administrative and historical documents, and to understand the importance of promoting cultural heritage in different ways (e.g. by writing educational articles, setting up exhibitions, organising cultural events, etc.). Moreover, they possess summarising, editing and writing skills, as well as communication skills and tools. Lastly, they are equipped with a broad cultural background enabling them to make multiple connections across a variety of topics.

These professionals can work both in the public and private sector, more specifically for State Archives, libraries, universities, public and private museums, company and bank archives, research centres and cultural institutions, public and private documentation centres, and departments of public administrations which require the above mentioned skills.

- EDITORS

Job functions include writing essays, general texts and educational articles on historical topics. Editors have a solid knowledge of historical processes, and can use different registers for writing texts according to their purpose (cultural or educational). Lastly, they have critical thinking skills enabling them to make connections between facts and to interpret the sources available.

These professionals work for paper and electronic journals covering not only historical studies, but also topics of general knowledge related to both human and natural sciences.

Initial knowledge required

QUALIFICATIONS AND KNOWLEDGE REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION

- high school diploma or other equivalent foreign qualification;
- background knowledge, reading comprehension and logical reasoning skills, a good command of Italian.

ADMISSION ASSESSMENT

Applicants' background knowledge is assessed by way of a self-evaluation test known as TOLC-SU, to be taken before enrolling in the programme. The test is mandatory, but non-selective.

Test questions are aimed to assess applicants' reading comprehension and knowledge of the Italian language, knowledge and skills acquired through studies, and logical reasoning.

ADDITIONAL LEARNING REQUIREMENTS (OFA) AND REMEDIAL ACTIVITIES

Applicants who fail to reach the minimum threshold score in the TOLC-SU test, as specified in the call for applications, will be assigned additional learning requirements (also known as OFA, from the Italian Obblighi Formativi Aggiuntivi) to fill their learning gaps.

The OFA must be fulfilled within the first year of the programme. In order to meet their OFA, students will have to complete remedial activities organised by the University.

Compulsory attendance

Attendance is strongly recommended, though not mandatory.

Internship criteria

Students can choose to carry out an internship instead of the 3-credit workshop.

Internships are managed in collaboration with the University Study and Career Guidance Service (COSP), which handle all administrative procedures.

Students who wish to undertake an internship must first contact the internship tutor of the degree programme for an orientation interview.

Degree programme final exams

After earning the required 174 credits, students may sit the final exam (6 credits) and obtain their degree.

For the final exam, students must write, present and discuss a paper — also known as thesis — on a topic agreed with their supervisor. The supervisor must be the lead instructor of a course that the student has included in the study plan and has attended as part of the Bachelor's programme. The paper, which should be approximately 50 pages long, normally consists in analysing, commenting, translating (if applicable), and contextualising sources, finds, documents, and critical and historiographical texts, using inquiry methods specific to the disciplinary domain of their chosen topic.

If the supervisor agrees, students can choose to write their thesis in English.

The thesis must be uploaded in digital format on the dedicated platform, and made available to the supervisor before the applicable deadlines for each graduation session.

The degree mark, on a scale of 110, will be established collectively by the Degree Board, taking into account the student's average exam grade, quality of the paper and ability to discuss their work with the Degree Board, particularly as regard the approach adopted, the sources used and the findings achieved. Students may be awarded 0 to 6 points for the final exam. Upon proposal of its chair, the Degree Board may unanimously award honours (lode) to graduates who have scored 110/110.

Notes

For-credit assessment B1

In order to obtain their degree, students must be proficient in English at a B1 level under the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). This proficiency level may be certified as follows:

- By submitting a language certificate attesting B1 or higher level in English and issued no more than three years before the date of submission. You will find the list of language certificates recognized by the University at: (<https://www.unimi.it/en/node/39322>). The certificate must be uploaded during the enrolment procedure, or subsequently to the portal <http://studente.unimi.it/uploadCertificazioniLingue>;

- By taking a placement test offered by the University Language Centre (SLAM) between October and December of the first year. Students who fail the test will be required to take a SLAM course. The placement test is mandatory for all those who do not hold a valid certificate attesting to B1 or higher level.

Those who have not taken the placement test by the end of December (end of January for Master's degree programmes) or fail the end-of-course exam six times must obtain the necessary certification privately before graduating.

Computer skills

Students who are supposed to earn 3 credits (CFU) for basic computer skills, as provided by their degree programme, have to attend the "Computer Science Course" through the e-learning platform of the project "3CFU Informatica" accessible at the following link: <https://3cfuinformatica.unimi.it>.

It is a blended course with a compulsory final exam.

The first exam session is scheduled for January, and more will follow according to a calendar to be made available on the course delivery platform.

EXPERIENCE OF STUDY ABROAD AS PART OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

The University of Milan supports international mobility by providing its students with the opportunity to spend study and internship periods abroad. It is a unique chance to enrich your educational path in a new exciting environment. The agreements entered into by the University with over 300 universities from the 27 EU member countries under the European Erasmus+ programme allow regularly enrolled students to carry out part of their studies at one of the partner universities or to undertake internships at companies, training and research centres and other organizations.

Similar international mobility opportunities are provided outside Europe, through agreements with a number of prestigious institutions.

The University of Milan is a member of the 4EU+ European University Alliance that brings together eight public multidisciplinary universities: University of Milan, Charles University of Prague, Heidelberg University, Paris-Panthéon-Assas University, Sorbonne University of Paris, University of Copenhagen, University of Geneva, and University of Warsaw. The 4EU+ Alliance offers integrated educational pathways and programmes to promote the international mobility of students (physical, blended and virtual).

Study and internships abroad

This history B.A. has a solid international exchange tradition which began with the founding of the ERASMUS, now ERASMUS Plus programme.

A concise overview of ERASMUS is available on the B.A. programme site on MyAriel platform, in the 'Contents' section.

These reciprocal agreements give students and teachers access to a year abroad, an exchange agreement between University of Milan and the universities of many countries including: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Lithuania, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, the Czech Republic, Romania, Spain, Sweden, Turkey, Hungary.

With Erasmus+ University of Milan also assigns study periods in Switzerland based on bilateral agreements with Swiss universities under the SEMP - Swiss European Mobility Programme.

It is possible to complete study periods ranging from a minimum of 3 to a maximum of 12 months during the three years of the programme, at one of the university's partner institutions. Average study periods abroad last 5-6 months. Study abroad (course attendance, exams, any thesis research work) is accredited on students' return with a number of study credits which take account of the activities completed abroad and the length of the period of time spent there. The related study

programme, called a Learning Agreement, is agreed on departure on the basis of courses, exams and activities at the partner university decided by students in accordance with their Italian study plans. Careful choice by the teaching staff responsible in identifying a wide ranging and specific correspondence between the University of Milan's educational programme and that of its partner universities enables students to take full advantage of their studies abroad and acquire the credits they need to complete their Italian studies. The study sectors which can be developed are essentially historical but credits in other humanities disciplines can also potentially be acquired.

This B.A. has a internationalisation and ERASMUS co-ordinator (Prof.ssa Michela Minesso) and a ERASMUS Traineeship coordinator (Prof.ssa Silvia Bussi). Every year, specific meetings for B.A. history students leaving for periods abroad are organised to supply them with the information they need on the various institutions available and useful contact numbers. The Department of Historical Studies "Federico Chabod" also has international research and teaching partnerships with institutions: in such cases, specific study plans are agreed with the co-ordinator and the work done is recognised in accordance with the criteria listed above.

The Department is also active in ERASMUS Plus-Placement which now provides for international exchange for new graduates (within 12 months of graduation), too, and information on the programmes which can be applied for is available on the website. The department works to identify international partners (archives, libraries, publishing houses, cultural institutions and universities) for internships designed to provide professional training.

How to participate in Erasmus mobility programs

The students of the University of Milan can participate in mobility programmes, through a public selection procedure.

Ad hoc commissions will evaluate:

- Academic career
- the candidate's proposed study programme abroad
- his/her foreign language proficiency
- the reasons behind his/her application

Call for applications and informative meetings

The public selection for Erasmus+ mobility for study generally begins around February each year with the publication of a call for applications specifying destinations and requirements. Regarding the Erasmus+ Mobility for Traineeship, the University of Milan usually publishes two calls a year enabling students to choose a destination defined by an inter-institutional agreement or to find a traineeship position on their own.

The University organizes informative meetings to illustrate mobility opportunities and rules for participation.

Erasmus+ scholarship

The European Union grants the winners of the Erasmus+ programme selection a scholarship to contribute to their mobility costs, which may be supplemented by the University funding for disadvantaged students.

Language courses
